Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time (15th/16th February 2025)

Trust is one word we hear very often from parents, professionals and marketers of goods and services. But sometimes we trust only to see ourselves hurt. I have seen people who say they don't trust anyone because of one experience or another. Some people trusted their spouses and got the worst hit in their lives. Some ask, "who can be trusted?"

Trust brings blessings. Today's readings remind us that true happiness, lies in the awareness that we are all children of a loving Heavenly Father and that we will be happy only when we share our blessings with our brothers and sisters in need, and work to uplift them. This will help us in declaring our "option for the poor," as Jesus did.

In the first reading (Jeremiah 17:5-8), Jeremiah indicates that a curse is on anyone who trusts in human beings, seeks strength in the flesh, and whose heart turns away from the Lord. On the contrary, the oracle of the Lord states that blessed is the one who trusts in the Lord, whose hope is the Lord. The prophecy gives more description of the two individuals. While the person who trusts in human beings would be like a barren bush in the desert that enjoys no change of season, the one who trusts in the Lord is like a tree planted beside the waters that enjoy a steady supply of water even in the seasons of drought.

In the Gospel reading today (Luke 6:17, 20-26), we hear our Lord's beatitudes where he ascribes "blessedness" to individuals with various spiritual and moral aptitudes. The individuals that are mentioned in the Lord's enlistment in the beatitudes share one thing in common, and that is "trust in God." It takes trust to go through poverty, hunger, weeping, hatred, and insults and still cling unto God.

A boy was taking a walk with his grandfather through a park, and suddenly they come to a little bridge with a stream beneath. Meaning to cross over and sensing that the little boy would be scared because of the shaky bridge, the grandpa says to the boy, "come on! Hold my hand!" The boy replies and says to him, "grandpa you hold my hand instead!". "What's the difference?" The boy says, "well grandpa, there is a big difference. If I hold your hand and something happens, and I slip, I may let go of your hand. But if you hold my hand, I know for sure that no matter what happens, you will never let my hand go!" What an expression of trust!

In life, we always choose where we put our trust and it determines how far we can go. You may have numerous reasons for not servicing the virtue of your trust in your life. It could be because you lost your spouse, child, a close relative or a relationship you cherished. Yes, things happen, and there would always be one challenge or the other, that is life.

In all these things and more, a man called Job still trusted in God and exclaimed, "Naked I came from my mother's womb, and naked shall I return there; the Lord gave, and the Lord has taken away; blessed be the name of the Lord" (Job 1:21). For this reason, God tells us to be still and know that He is God (Psalm 46:10) and He knows the end of your life from the beginning (Isaiah 46:10). Your trust could turn things around to blessings. We need to respond to the challenge of the Beatitudes in our daily life. Millions are starving, persecuted, homeless, and leading hopeless lives. The only way the promises of the Beatitudes can become a reality for them is through the efforts of people like us. Let us remember that each time we reach out to help the needy, the sick, or the oppressed, we share with them a foretaste of the promises of the Beatitudes here and now.

Bible Reflection—16th February 2025

With Jesus those who were social outcasts find a place in the kingdom of God. The good news is that the poor, hungry, weeping, and excluded are 'blessed' because Jesus' very presence and ministry among them gathers them into the kingdom of God. The source of blessedness is not social condition but Jesus himself.

Last Sunday both Isaiah and Peter thought that their sinfulness made them unworthy of divine presence. In this gospel those who thought they were beyond blessing discover that Jesus comes to them.

In every society there are attitudes, language, and behaviours that stigmatise those considered 'unworthy.' This fact is already a judgment that the kingdom of God has not yet fully taken hold.

Who was St Valentine?

Although not much of St. Valentine's life is reliably known, and whether or not the stories involve two different saints by the same name, it is highly agreed that St. Valentine was martyred and then buried on the Via Flaminia to the north of Rome.

One common story about St. Valentine is that as the former Bishop of Terni, Narnia and Amelia, he was on house arrest with Judge Asterius. While discussing religion and faith Valentine pledged the validity of Jesus. The judge immediately put Valentine and his faith to the test.

St. Valentine was presented with the judge's blind daughter and told to restore her sight. If he succeeded, the judge vowed to do anything for Valentine. Placing his hands onto her eyes, Valentine restored the child's vision.


Judge Asterius was humbled and obeyed Valentine's requests. Asterius broke all the idols around his house, fasted for three days and became baptized, along with his family and entire 44 member household. The now faithful judge then freed all of his Christian inmates.

St. Valentine was arrested again for continuing to try to convert people to Christianity. He was sent to Rome under the emperor Claudius Gothicus (Claudius II). According to the popular hagiographical identity, and what is believed to be the first representation of St. Valentine, the Nuremberg Chronicle, St. Valentine was a Roman priest martyred during Claudius' reign. The story tells that St. Valentine was imprisoned for marrying Christian couples and aiding Christians being persecuted by Claudius. Both acts were considered serious crimes. A relationship between the saint and emperor began to grow, until Valentine attempted to convince Claudius of Christianity. Claudius became raged and sentenced Valentine to death, commanding him to renounce his faith or be beaten with clubs and beheaded.

St. Valentine refused to renounce his faith and Christianity and was executed outside the Flaminian Gate on February 14, in approximately 269. Other depictions of St. Valentine's arrests tell that he secretly married couples so husbands wouldn't have to go to war. Another variation of the legend of St. Valentine says he refused to sacrifice to pagan gods, was imprisoned and while imprisoned he healed the jailer's blind daughter. On the day of his execution, he left the girl a note signed, "Your Valentine."
