Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time (22nd/23rd February 2025)

Brothers and sisters,

Today's readings reminds us of the essential virtues and elements of our Christian life which include mercy, compassion, love of God and neighbour, self-control, appreciation of values, moral responsibility, awareness of sin, and the sacred sense. These, and other practicals of the Christian life mark our ongoing spirituality and Christian growth.

In my country—Nigeria, we have this famous adage in broken English which says, "do me, I do you, God, no go vex!" Which means in English language, "if I pay you back with the same evil, God would not be angry." Everywhere in the world, various legal systems have predetermined punishments for the offences people commit against each other like, traffic offences, murder, manslaughter, defamation, insults, and others. It seems that nature supports retaliation as a balancing factor in the present age. In the First Reading (1 Samuel 26:2,7-9,12-13, 22-23), we learn about King Saul's relentless hunt for the life of David. David had the death warrant of his enemies in his hands, yet he refused to pronounce it. But, he left it for God to do in His way and at His appropriate time. He kept to God's word: "Do not repay anyone evil for evil. Do not take revenge. Vengeance is mine" (Rom 12: 17-19; Deut. 32:35). Consequently, David made a wise decision not to kill Saul. He returned kindness for wickedness, gave love in exchange for hatred, and overcame evil with good. In the second reading (1 Cor. 15:45-49), St. Paul reminds us how the "First Adam" made a wrong decision of disobedience, bringing death into the world, whereas Jesus, the "Second Adam," made the right choice of fulfilling his Father's saving plan for mankind by accepting acute suffering and a heinous death

In today's Gospel (Luke 6:27-38), Jesus gave a very important sermon on these essential virtues and elements that must guide our lives and actions as Christians. It is a new commandment because it overrules the Old Testament law of reprisal attack or retaliative justice. There is no doubt that humanly speaking, it is a very difficult one. It demands a lot of sacrifice and courage. In God's ways and thoughts, the good should prevail over evil. In the Book of Proverbs (17:13), God says, "if anyone returns evil for good, evil will never leave his house." In his letter to the Romans (12:17-21), St. Paul instructs that we should not repay evil for evil, but we should be careful to do what is right in the eyes of everyone. Hurts and wounds do not heal so fast. In some cases, their scars do not disappear entirely during one's lifetime.

May we learn to leave vengeance for God, and never take every opportunity for revenge against our offenders. Forgiveness heals all wounds and wipes all scars away.

Let us avoid bowing to pressures from circumstances or our colleagues to do evil. This is because two wrongs can never make one right. Payback or revenge may hurt one even more than it will hurt one's offender. Sometimes, we may win the war but not the peace, love, and friendship.

Sometimes in life, you might be hurting over something or someone and planning to retaliate. You might be "right" because you are not at fault. However, take a little time to think through what our Lord is reminding us today:

To your enemies, show love. To those who curse you, bless. To anyone who strikes you, do not retaliate. To anyone who asks, give (if you have). To anyone who offends you, show mercy and forgive.

God is good! All the time.



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21st - 23rd February—Jubilee of Deacons

The deacon is obligated to give priority to the spiritual life and to live his diakonia with generosity. His model par excellence is Jesus Christ, the Servant who lived totally at the service of his Father for the good of every person. It is necessary that each deacon must know Christ intimately to live out his ministry to the fullest, whether he is celibate or married.

In his 2021 address to deacons, Pope Francis expressed a greater focus on cultivating humility and generosity in ministry. Speaking to them, the Holy Father says he expects humble deacons, letting all good be a secret between him and God; he expects deacons to be good spouses, fathers, and grandfathers, inspiring others with their witness of joy

in everything without complaining; he expects deacons to be sentinels, to both know the face of the poor and also help the Christian faithful recognize Jesus in them.

The deacon exercises his ministry within the communion and mission of a diocesan Church and in direct relationship with his diocesan bishop, under whose authority he is assigned, as a collaborator in the service of God's people. As collaborators in ministry, serving alongside priests, deacons participate in the one apostolic ministry bestowed by Christ upon the Apostles and their successors. chrome-extension://efaidnbmnnnibpcajpcglclefindmkaj/https://www.usccb.org/resources/lublee2025_Deacons.pdf

In Pope Francis' 2021 address to deacons he said, "I know that you are also present in Caritas and in other bodies that are close to the poor. In this way you will never lose your bearings: deacons will not be "half-priests" or second-rate priests, nor with they be "special altar boys", no, that is not the path to follow; they will be caring servants who do their best to ensure that no one is excluded and the love of the Lord touches people's lives in a tangible way. In short, one could summarise diaconal spirituality in a few words, that is, the spirituality of service: willingness on the inside and openness on the outside. Willingness on the inside, from the heart, ready to say yes, docile, without making life revolve around one's own agenda; and open on the outside, looking at everyone, especially those who are left out, those who feel excluded." https://www.vatican.va/content/

In this Jubilee Year, may deacons do everything with humility, with joy without complaining, and in radical hospitality to the poor and marginalized. May they allow the love of Jesus to flow from them, as they humbly serve others as missionary disciples. May they listen with tender care and affection to the needs of others, especially the poor in their communities. In this way, they will be messengers of hope to the world. Amen

bring God's closeness to others without imposing themselves, serving with humility and joy. The generosity of a deacon who gives of himself without seeking the front ranks has about him the perfume of the Gospel, he tells of the greatness of God's humility in taking the first step - always, God always takes the first step - to meet even those who have turned their backs on him."
